In Case You Missed It

August's speaker, Jay Thurrott, is well-known to BSSF members. A resident of Port Orange, Florida, he is current president of the Bromeliad Society International (BSI). His previous presentation to the BSSF was in September 2013

on the subject of growing bromeliads from seed.

Jay's August program dealt with the BSI 2014 World Bromeliad Conference, and his very nice collection of photos of the Hawaii venue provided members with irrefutable proof of why the World Conference is never held in Nevada.

Actually, the BSI has

criteria other than climate and natural beauty for selecting the site for its biennial World Conference. It must be held in a major city in a hotel with conference space. That would help explain the choice of Chicago in 2004. Since then the BSI has done some globetrotting: San Diego in 2006; Cairns, the society's first venture outside the continental U.S., in 2008; New Orleans, for the third time, in 2010; and Orlando in 2012. For the 2014 conference, the Hawaii Bromeliad Society volunteered to play host, a remarkable undertaking for a society that numbers probably no more than ten.

Following a five-hour flight from California, the Florida contingent encountered a land of unparalleled visual allure, as well as certain unique traits. There are definitely different gastronomic strokes for the island folks; for instance, Jay immediately noticed the popularity of Spam© in Hawaiian cuisine. Apparently it gained a certain cachet in the islands from its use by G.I.s stationed there during World War II. Seventy years later, no less a gastronomic trendsetter than McDonald's includes Spam on its menu. *Mon Dieu*!

The Ala Moana Hotel was selected as headquarters for the World Conference. It is located adjacent to the largest open-air shopping

center in the U.S. and just a seashell's throw from W a i k i k i Beach. It is also next to parkland that attracts a s i z a b l e chunk of

Hawaii's homeless population. Apparently the mantra "Location, Location, Location" works as well for the dispossessed as for the more fortunate among us.

As is customary, the first day of the World Conference was devoted to the annual BSI board meeting, which attracted a truly worldwide representation of bromeliad lovers. As is also customary, seminars have great allure to attendees, and the 2014 conference featured a grower's program. Considering that all bromeliads that are found in Hawaii had to be imported, they have become an integral part of

the state's landscaping. There are lots of bromeliad hybridizers in the island chain, including David Shiigi, whose Guzmania 'Kapoho Flame' has achieved great popularity with florists, along with Peter De Mello, David Fell, and Sharon Peterson.

The venerable Lyon Arboretum was the first site



visit on the agenda of World Conference participants. Perched on a hillside, it is accessible by a road too narrow for tour buses. Upon entering the property, visitors from the mainland encountered enormous

Alcantareas. The year-round amenability of Hawaii's climate means that bromeliads don't need to be moved seasonally to avoid being scorched by the sun. Seemingly daily rains also make germination of bromeliad seeds easy.

From Lyon Arboretum, the group -- pressed for time everywhere it went -- moved on to the Punchbowl [the crater of an extinct volcano], now the site of a national cemetery containing many World War II casualties.

Not surprisingly, the World Conference plant sale was a huge attraction. Sales reached into the \$150-200,000 range. Because of strict regulations in Hawaii, many of the sale plants had to be brought in bare-root. (However, transport to the U.S. mainland is quite easy.) And because of the difficulty of shipping plants into Hawaii – they are subjected to a one-year quarantine – there was no judged bromeliad show at the 2014 conference. Instead, conference organizers encouraged exhibits.



Jay made special mention of one attendee, Herb Plever, a resident of New York City who grows all his bromeliads indoors. He has been a BSI member since the 1950s and has written about his experiences as an

indoor grower.

Nursery tours are among Jay's favorite activities

during World Conferences, and he reported that David Fell's nursery was particularly impressive, boasting perfect growing conditions. How Fell grows seedlings is interesting: He uses shredded coconut fiber in trays, then community pots, then individual seed trays. He is able to grow in five years what takes ten years to achieve in Florida.

Conference attendees also visited Sharon Peterson's nursery. Jay noted that while the land was cheap, inasmuch as it came unequipped with water and sewer service, the plants were

The group next hopped to Hilo for a tour of David Shiigi's nursery, as well as his personnel collection. In addition to being an excellent hybridizer, Shiigi is also an ardent cook, specializing in barbecue.

Jay commented on the flora and fauna that seem to grow wild everywhere, especially guavas, chickens and cats. [Alex Bello explained that Hurricane Iniki in 1992 destroyed a number of chicken-breeding operations, releasing a lot of stock into the wild. They're now protected by Hawaiian law.]



The next tour destination was Volcano National Park, which boasts great beauty in spite of the absence of bromeliads. The trip to

the park was not without drama: Two tires fell off the tour bus in spite of its having been serviced the night before. But fear aside, it provided a learning experience and answered the age-old question, "Why do tour buses have *four* tires on each axle?"

While Volcano National Park contained no bromeliads, it had volcanic vents in profusion. Hawaii's geologic peculiarities make its local news unusual: reportage includes lava flows encroaching at a molasses pace to residential areas.

Jay noted also having become aware of another Hawaiian practice as unique as the love of Spam. Home ownership is free to native Hawaiians. But when a native homeowner dies, his/her non-native spouse is evicted from the property. Alas, this was never mentioned during any episode of "Hawaii Five-O."

Jay concluded his informative and pictorially engaging program by announcing that the 2016 BSI World Bromeliad Conference will be held in Houston from June 13-19.

Barbara Partagas added a poignant pairing of events that occurred during her flight home from Hawaii. The pilot announced that a Pearl Harbor survivor was on board. Then, near the end of the flight, passengers were asked to delay leaving the cabin until the body of a military casualty was removed from the plane.

In Honor of Sara Donayre Sara S. Donayre – A Celebration of Life by Pepe Donayre

Sara was a brave and adventurous woman; she was a lover of human contact; and, she was a true giver. She was brave enough to elope with



a Peruvian; and, after marrying in Boston against the wishes of her parents, arrived in country whose culture she did not She literally know. did not know what to expect. Love gives strength, of course, but her youthful act was brave and admirable.

While I was doing academic work at my

University, she was left to her own devices.

Soon, though, at stores and supermarkets she made acquaintances and was surrounded by friends – later to be life friends she introduced me to.

Once, at a cleaners, everybody started running away from the place, terror in their faces. She stayed inside and was astonished at the others' fleeing. All alone, she was bewildered until somebody returned to the site and pulled her out. The terror was derived from a strong tremor, frequent in Lima, and the native Bostonian merely thought it was just the noise of the "Underground." Even today, there is no subway in Lima! After that, many other tremors, some quite strong, never made her even blink.

She could not be just a housewife and wanted a job -- right now!. I had to talk to a a notable gynecologist, a friend of mine, whose clients were mainly wives of U.S. officials in Peru. I offered to him a full English speaking nurse – my Sara. He was overwhelmed and had her working in his prívate practice the following day. I used to tease her by saying that I was paying him to take her as his assistant.

She was really the main motivation for me to get involved in bromeliads, always supportive and full of ideas until she became involved herself as a helper and organizer. Her energy was so overwhelming that a notable person in the FCBS once said she was a "force of nature." Boy! Was she one! And that force and energy was felt in every organization she committed herself to the following: the BSBC, as Secretary of the BSI and as an officer of our neighborhood organization the Hollywood Lakes Civic Association.

Her survival and the way she fought for almost four years until the end only testify to her strength of character and determination. I and others would not be the same without her.

Broward Co. Bromeliad Society will hold a short memorial for Sara during their regular meeting on September 14th which starts at 6:30pm. The meeting is to be held at Deicke Auditorium, 5701 Cypress Road, Plantation, FL 33317. It's a couple of blocks north of Broward Blvd. and a couple of miles west of I-95. All are welcome to attend.


BromeliAdvisory: On that note, let us end this conversation.


