The BSSF's October meeting marked attendees' emergence from the purgatory visited upon us by Hurricane Irma, and a couple of items signaled that recovery is shifting into a new gear.

First, the membership demonstrated its interest in helping Fairchild Tropical Botanic Garden climb back from storm damage by approving a contribution of \$1,000 to the Garden. Half that amount was allocated for the purchase of a large quantity of Neoregelia 'Fireball' to reestablish the double row that had beautified the Bailey Palm Glade for a number of years. The other half of the donation was earmarked for the purchase of a Show & Sale ad in Fairchild's quarterly magazine, The Tropical Garden.

Second, we began to talk about our own rebound from the hurricane. The storm-delayed and much anticipated annual auction has been rescheduled for November 21. Looking a bit further into the future, Alan Herndon announced that the Show & Sale will have a new – and earlier – date in 2018. Our 40th Show & Sale will be held on March 24-25, a full month earlier than last year. Accordingly,

Alan urged members to start setting plants aside now. With seasonal cooling already underway, the plants should achieve their best color by the time of the show.

Alan went on to describe the show award hierarchy. There are five major groups in the competition: (1) Blooming, (2) Non-blooming, (3) Habitat, (4) Artistic, and (5) Exhibition.

Start preparing for the 40th Annual BSSF Show in 2018

Ideally, you should have started to prepare for the 2018 show as soon as the 2017 show ended. Of course, there was the minor manner of a hurricane that might have interfered with your careful plans, but now is the time to regroup and get your potential show plants on track to being beautiful specimens for the show.

Since our show is relatively early next year (setup is 22 March), we can't be entirely certain what types of plants will be in bloom. If we have a cold (ok,ok...I know we don't have any idea what cold weather is, but I am talking cooler than last year) winter, the show may be too early to have most of the larger *Neoregelia* hybrids in bloom. Of course, *Neoregelia* hybrids can be just as spectacular when they are not blooming, and we can always expect some miniature Neo species to flagrantly disregard external weather conditions and be in flower at any time of the year. *Neoregelia compacta* and closely related species are also more likely to be in bloom during the

cooler months and should be considered as potential entries.

Other plants that might be favored by the early show date are the *Billbergia* species and hybrids. These plants bloom preferentially during the cooler months. Of course, you need to set several pots aside as potential entries since the bloom



cycle is so short on an individual plant. With some luck, one of your pots will have flowers just opening on the morning when judging takes place. By the way, do not overlook plants that are currently in bloom, or have recently bloomed. *Billbergia* pups often grow rapidly, and there is plenty of time for pups on plants currently in bloom to reaching blooming size before the show. If you have a spectacular *Billbergia* hybrid blooming right now, you might want to leave the pups on the mother plant over winter so they can grow faster. Nearer show time, you can decide whether the clump of plants or individual plants in separate pots will make the best entries.

In the genus Aechmea, cool season blooming plants include the various forms of Aechmea weilbachii, and the species of Aechmea subgenus Ortgiesia (including, but not limited to: A. apocalyptica, A. caudata, A. gamosepala and A. organensis). Again, these plants may have already bloomed, or may bloom during the coming weeks. The pups grow quickly, and have plenty of time to be blooming for our show.

As the initial step, you should identify your potential show plants, and try to separate them from each other and from other plants in your garden as well as possible. Much of the leaf damage we see on our plants is caused by the marginal spines from one rosette rubbing against the tender leaves of a neighbor. If you do not have sufficient room to separate the plants widely enough that their leaves do not overlap, at least put them in an area that provides some shelter from wind. The other step you should take at this time is a good cleaning of your prospective winners. While you remove the bits of plant debris that have accumulated in the leaf axils of your chosen plants, you can also inspect the plants for scale and other signs of infestation by pests or infection by fungi. If problems are detected at this point, they should be treated quickly so they don't present a bigger problem when you are trying to clean the plants during the last few weeks before the show.

If you are growing *Cryptanthus* for the show, be especially vigilant about the weather. A dry northerly breeze slightly under 50F can burn the leaves of a perfectly grown *Cryptanthus* as badly as leaving the plant out in full sun for a day. Protection from wind is the best way to avoid this. Don't be afraid to set aside a plant with some damage on the leaves as a potential show plant. The judges have all lived through hurricanes in the recent past, and know what kind of damage they inflict. If a plant looks good from the top and damage is largely hidden by new growth at the time of the show, we can expect them to be less stringent in their ribbon judging.

In addition to starting to prepare your plants for the show, we need volunteers to help run the show. First, we need Chairs and Co-chairs for the various committees:

Advertising – this committee sells ads in the Show Book that help defray the cost of printing.

Auction – We hope Peter Kouchalakos will once again return as our Auctioneer, but we need a Chair to make sure the auction is set up when needed. Duties will include collecting donations from commercial vendors for the Saturday Auction and members for the Sunday Auction, making sure the necessary supplies are available well before the Auction starts, recruiting volunteers to act as runners as well as one or two cashiers, and anything else needed to ensure a successful Auction.

Award Sponsors – Barbara Sparling has held this job for a number of years, and could use help. The job is to call all members of BSSF and ask for donations to support the show – especially the rosette ribbons and crystals given to major award winners.

Awards – Again, Barbara Sparling has been in charge of this for years and is looking for

a successor. Keeping track of the inventory of ribbons and crystal is a major part of the job.

Catering – Sandy Roth is the perennial chair of this committee, and the most overworked person in the show. She could use several cochairs to help plan for and feed all of the volunteers over the 4 days of the show.

Hospitality/Security-Fairchild asks us to keep monitors at entrances and exits to the garden during open hours. We also would like to have people out in the sales area and in the show room who can generally help visitors enjoy our show. Chair of this committee recruits volunteers to serve in the various positions and schedules them so the entire show is covered.

Information Table – This job is similar to that of Hospitality/Security, but it is centered on a single spot. The information table sits at the entrance to the show room, and aims to help visitors enjoy our show. The information table also has material for distribution to visitors. Again, scheduling volunteers to ensure that the Information Table is operating throughout the entire show is the most important job.

Member Sales – Volunteers are needed to handle sales transactions at the Member Sales Table and deliver the proceeds from each day to the Treasurer or his representative at the end of each day.

Plant Holding – Antonio Arbelaez he has does this for many years. The job is setting up a holding area near the entrance to the show where visitors wanting to go into the show rooms can leave their plants.

Publicity – Robert Meyer handles the more traditional forms of publicity, but we also need a presence on the newer forms of social media.

Show Booklet – We produce a booklet for each show to give visitors some basic information on bromeliads and what the show is all about. The job is to collect the information needed for the booklet and create a layout that can be used by the printer to produce the finished book.

Staging – Before any plants or artwork is brought in, we need to set up tables for plants and display panels for student art. This is generally finished before noon on our setup day.

If you have any interest in working on one of these committees, please let me or a listed committee chair know. We particularly need people willing to act as co-chairs with the idea of taking over the main responsibility for the committee at some time in the future.
