Just within days, Bobbe Dolloey passed away. A long time member, volunteer at Fairchild, and involved in more concepts than about anyone I know, she will be sorely missed. The FCBS recently alerted us about the recent losses in the bromeliad world. Reprinting of the obituaries follows in honor of those people and out Bobbe Dooley.

Born in Ft. Worth, TX on Nov 22, 1923, made her transition from this life on Nov 6, 2018. Her almost 95 years of life were filled with great



adventure, many successes and much love. Following her graduation from University of Texas, majoring in music, Bobbe both instructed music and was a featured piano and vocal soloist in numerous concerts and productions. In

1945, she married Joseph W Dooley, a US Naval Aviator and for nearly the next 20 years "Home was where the Navy sent them" until finally landing in Miami. In 1955, Bobbe and Joe founded Dooley Realty where they "Put Down Roots Not Branches". 
Eleanor's story starts on January 8, 1921 when she was born in Ft. Myers, Florida, as the oldest child to George and Esther Rinkel. Eleanor lived a full and blessed 97 years, during which time she humbly, but with great commitment, resolved to be and do good. She possessed all of the quintessential traits of being among the most interesting women in the world: adventurous, fearless, rugged, strong, industrious and, at the same time, kind, humble, creative and an avid recycler who believed that everything was useful in it's first function and well beyond.

Eleanor lived her life in service to faith, hope and charity. She put God first above all else and was the longest tenured member of the First Presbyterian Church on Second Street in Ft. Myers, where she participated in the chancel and bell choirs for more than six decades. At a close second was her family, for whom she spent countless hours cooking, quilting, gardening and canning. She was active in operating the family businesses, Kinzie's Rose Garden, Kinzie's Florist and Kinzie's Wholesale Nursery, which is still in operation today. Next is her devotion to the community where she was born and raised. As a native of Ft. Myers, Florida, she was a member of the Pioneer Club of Lee County, and she gave back in so many ways including generous contributions to the First Presbyterian Church and P.E.O. (Philanthropic Educational Organization), which provides higher educational opportunities for women. She loved the outdoors, admiring all the flora and fauna, and fishing the backwaters of Sanibel. Additionally, she earnestly served her passion for her hobbies, which included growing orchids and bromeliads, scrapbooking, quilting, and stamp and coin collecting. She was a member of Southwest Florida Quilters' Guild, Southwest Florida Orchid Society and Caloosahatchee Bromeliad Society, serving as an officer at times throughout the years, and she was an international accredited master bromeliad judge.

A Celebration of her life will be held Wednesday, July 25, 2018, at 11:00 a.m. at The First Presbyterian Church, 2438 Second Street, downtown Ft. Myers. Visitation will be held one hour prior to the funeral service. A reception will follow immediately after the service, and internment will take place at the Ft. Myers Cemetery following the reception. CHET BLACKBURN — Published in The Sacramento Bee on Sept. 19, 2018

Chester "Chet" Homer Blackburn passed away on September 15, 2018 at his home in Auburn, CA in the familiar surroundings of his family, dog, and



plants. He was 85 years old. Chet was born in Cincinnati OH, moving to California when he was 18 years old to join the service and go to college. He married his wife Jean in 1968, bringing her and her four young daughters Leslie,

Laura, Linda, and Lisa to the Auburn area. The prankster-in-chief and Jean were months shy of their 50th wedding anniversary.

A plant collector since high school in Ohio, Chet had cultivated thousands of diverse and rare plants on his 8-acre garden in Auburn. The upkeep of this vast plant collection kept Chet busy during retirement, sharing the maintenance with Jean. He specialized in bromeliads and native plants. Chet, a member of the Bromeliad Society since 1976, was the go-to person for all things bromeliad. Chet was the editor of the international botanical journal, the Journal of the Bromeliad Society, from 1996-2002. Having over 1,500 varieties of bromeliads in his collection, he even had a species of bromeliad named for him: Vriesea blackburniana. Chet was an invaluable member of


the Redbud Chapter of the California Native Plant Society since its founding in 1991, having held almost every position on the board from president on down.

He put together an impressive "Living Wildflower Show" in the spring each year, transporting plants from his home nursery. Chet was the project coordinator for two definitive reference books, Wildflowers of Nevada and Placer Counties and Trees and Shrubs of Nevada and Placer Counties, and contributed content to the wildflower book's second edition. To share his love of plants with his grandchildren, Chet created a most unusual kid-friendly plant: his "doughnut tree." Planted 30 years ago, the "seed" for the doughnut tree was actually a Cheerio given to him by his grandchild. With grandpa's help, the preschooler carefully planted the seed outside the sunroom window so the doughnut tree's progress could be easily seen. When that child visited again at Easter, Chet decorated a large Chinese Pistache tree near the planting spot with more than a dozen doughnuts. That delicious harvest turned into an annual family tradition."Now we have doughnut harvests every spring," Chet said. "If it's a cold winter, they're all frosted doughnuts. But I'd have to say, that doughnut tree is the rarest plant in my collection." Chet is survived by his wife Jean; children: Laura (Jacek), Linda (James), and Lisa (Gregg); grandchildren: Keith, Kirsten (John), Amber (Brian), Katrina (Jacob), Stephen (Alexis), Zach, Andy, Alex, and Aaron; and greatgrandchildren: Sawyer, Molly, and Bentley. An open house will be held on Saturday September 22, 2018 at Chet's home from 1:00 - 4:00 pm.

Her expertise was in such demand that she worked in her lab until the age of seventy-seven.

All who knew Maureen think of her each time they see a bromeliad. She was an avid gardener and horticulturist and was both member and held all forms of leadership roles at the Fort Lauderdale Garden Club, the Moringa Garden Circle, the Bromeliad Society of Broward County, and the International Bromeliad Society. She was one of the founding parishioners of St. Bonaventure Catholic Church in Davie, Florida where she was the first choir leader, and Eucharistic minister. She started the Young at Heart group that she actively participated in throughout her retirement years.

Matriarch Maureen was a businesswoman, an adventurer, an environmental preservationist, community organizer and hand-holder. She encouraged all in her sphere to be strong, independent and strive for excellence. We can hear the bells ringing as we have another Angel in Heaven.

DON BEADLE – Article from September 2013 BromeliAdvisory

A Louisiana born native, he had to move on. "Not a Cajun," he self-describes.

He entered the military and left after becoming an engineer who sought greater worlds than oil fields. So began the world of hobbies. One day, he received a bromeliad. It did not grow well. A friend advised that he try an Aechmea "Black Jack." It lasted. That friend was John Anderson – an eventually renowned cultivator of Aechmea.

Soon, Don wanted to own every variety of every species of the bromeliad world. But, a finite pocket and accompanying wallet made such an urge become more of an afflicting itch, than a despondent dream.

He wanted to enter the world of hybridizing. Neoregelia were already dumfoundingly addressed in the bromeliad charts. Billbergia were the ignored – the stepchildren of the bromeliad world of hybridizing. That simple fact is why the Beadle world entered the world of billbergia.

Billbergia's unusually short life span made preservation of pollen a chore. He tried bagging the stuff in plastic. It went bad. Then bagged the pollen and froze the contents. That worked. From there the pollenization of cultivars with different time periods began.

Today's billbergia are commonly speckled – giving the great effect of stained glass luminescence. This all started with Don's receipt of Bob Whitman's "Domingos Martins." He crossed that spotty plant with "Ed McWilliams" which produced "Hallelujah" – often the crowd



favorite for decades to follow.

As space became a valuable commodity, he met surfer dudes in Corpus Christi, Texas who worked as carpenters during the off season. They built Don a two-story home, from which his second floor master bedroom walked out to a shade house, beneath which was more growing space with the Beadle extra comforts – including a hot tub from which the neighbors' boys peeped over and to whom "he never disappointed them."

Photographing was another passion and thousands of slides of the hybrids were shot and kept in the Texas facility.

One year, he packed his truck and took his loyal miniature dog for a ride to see buddies Harry Luther and Wally Berg. To his dismay, they had gone south of the border for a bromeliad excursion. Don liked the surroundings and called a local realtor asking for a home with "a ski lift to the back door, beach front, and space for green houses." She had just the thing.

In a phone call that same day, the property was bought and Don moved to Florida in 1986 to become el jefe de Los Milagros.

The years of hybridizing increased as he fitted the facility with more shade houses, and other

amenities. His engineering background made such home improvement projects less stressful – and in fact were his joy. In 2000, Don sold his nursery to Michael Kiehl, got a boat and made the boat another engineering/repairing venture for his fix-it skills.

After selling that boat and moving back to the land, Don enjoys his time with another boat project and occasionally working at Kiehl's where he can work without being paid.

As stated on the FCBS page, "Don's passion for bromeliads led to ground breaking Billbergia cultivars that made this genus one of the most popular; his ground breaking bromeliad photography set the standard for bromeliad pictures; his passion for knowledge led to the Bromeliad Cultivar Registry; his vision for an accurate registry accessible and available to one and all took him beyond his peers and now serves the entire world."
