#### In Case You Missed it

Hort, Charcoal Lava

At the August general meeting, Steve Byram conducted a class appropriately titled "Bromeliads



101." Current president of the Bromeliad Guild of Tampa Bay, as well as a Pasco County Master Gardener, Steve provided a quick-paced survey of the bromeliad family.

Steve began with a look at the parts that make up a bromeliad. He pointed

out a very practical use for very spiny genera, such as Dyckia or Hechtia: Plant them in front of your daughter's bedroom window. When it comes to working with the more vicious species, he recommended using long work gloves. Extenders, he added, can be made from tube socks. Goatskin gloves are a good product, because they stay pliable.

He emphasized that while bromeliads are tropical plants, they are <u>not</u> swamp plants. Accordingly, it isn't wise to overwhelm them with water. As an aid to drainage, he recommended using lava rocks around terrestrial specimens. His slides illustrated the versatility of bromeliads, specifically their deployment in baskets or mounted. Cedar wood provides a long-lasting

medium for mounting. (Steve warned against mounting bromeliads on creosoted wood, because it contains a copper compound that will kill the plant slowly.) Plants can also be mounted on chains, poles, or high stumps.

Steve then examined the components of various



mixes for successfully growing bromeliads. Wood mixes include mulch, sawdust, horticultural charcoal, cedar bark, and coir (coconut husk fiber). More specifically, he explained that mulch constituents can be cypress, pine, cedar, melaleuca, or eucalyptus. Stone mixes

include perlite, vermiculite, lava rock, azomite, and pumice. Compost mixes include leaf mold, manure, worm castings, sphagnum/Canadian peat, and humic acid. A potting mix should be replaced after two or three years; otherwise, it will begin to hold too much moisture.

For bromeliads kept indoors, Steve recommended

putting pea gravel in a saucer and then placing the container on top of the gravel. That practice increases humidity around the plant without having it sit in water.



When it comes to liquid nutrition, it is good to dip a plant into a

combination of Quick Start, Superthrive, and Miracle Grow, provided the mix is used at no more than one-quarter strength. For granular fertilizers, Steve recommended Dynamite or Peters, but also urged growers to be careful to avoid putting these fertilizers in bromeliad cups. Significantly, he doesn't ordinarily use fertilizer on terrestrial bromeliads after the initial shot at planting time. Don't overdo fertilizing or the plants may turn green.

Next Steve talked about separating pups. He

recommended that a pup should be onethird to one-half the size of the mother plant. The grower can cut the pup off with pruners. He recommended using bypass pruners instead of anvil-style pruners; the latter is best used on dead wood. If bypass pruners are not available, a mini hacksaw or another tool with a serrated blade can be used.

Bromeliads can be induced, or forced, to bloom by using apples. Simply place

the plant and the fruit in close proximity and cover them with a plastic bag for one to two weeks. A grower can also use the growth regulator Florel, but it's very important to follow the directions carefully.

For the control of mosquitoes, Steve recommended Mosquito Bits. The product should be applied every two months, and the grower should wear gloves when making applications.

There is good source reading material for those interested in growing bromeliads. Among his favorites are books by Pamela Crawford. Titles include Easy Gardens for South Florida, Best Garden Color for Florida, and Container Gardens for Florida. All the photos in her books are in color. Among magazines, Florida Gardening stands out; it addresses plants in climate zones 9 and 10. Steve urged growers to become familiar with plant hardiness zone maps.

Plant club newsletters are also a good source of information for growers, as are IFAS publications and the Facebook pages of various plant societies.

#### GETTING READY FOR THE BLOOMING MARCH SHOW

This publication earlier outlined how to buy plants from others, keep the plant alive for the requisite 6 months, and deliver that plant "grown by others" for your trophy at the Show.

Now to refine that strategy – what do you do if you want to have a "blooming plant?" Or, how does oneI know if a particular plant will be in bloom?

To aid in answering this question, the editor has gone over older editions of the Bromeli Advisory and listed the plants which were in bloom at or around the time of the show in previous years. Of course, weather changes, or whatever other variables may exist, may make last years's bloomer, this years dud.

But, the list is helpful. Here it is:

Aechmea: apocalyptica, amicorum, andersoniana, araneosa, azurea, blanchetiana, bromeliifolia, bruegegeri, calyculata, capixabae carvahloi, caudata, chantinii,comate, contracta, David Barry, dealbata, fasciata, fenderleri, fosteriana, fulgens, gamosepala,gurkeniana, kerteziae, linharaesiorum, Little Harv, mexicana, milsteiniana, miniata discolor, nudicaulis, , orlandiana (var. orlandiana, Ensign), Ortgiesia (caudata, guaratubensis) penduliflora, pementi-velosi glabra, pineliana (Giant form), racinae, recurvata benrathii, roberto-anselmoi seideliana tillandsioides, Victoria, victoriana, warasii, warasii discolor, weilbachii viridispala.

Androlepis: skinneri

Billbergia: amoena, euphemiae, lymanii angustifolia, nutans, reichardti

Canistropsis: billbergioides, seidelii (yellow bracts), seidelii (red bracts)

Canistrum: fosteriana lanigerum

Cryptanthus: bahianus, caudata, , beuckeri, burle-marxii, dianae, warren-loosei

Fernseea bocainensis

Fosterella micrantha

Guzmania: lingulata, sanguinea Tricolor

Hohenbergia: distans

Lymania: corallina


