Terrie has a Ph.D. in marine biology and is a research scientist for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. She also makes quilts and SCUBA dives.

# Garden Notes - Dec 2011 by Alan Herndon

After the brief cool spell in October, we have

consistently had temperatures well above the seasonal average until the end of this month. Even with the current dip, the daytime temperature reaches the expected average for this time of year. As a consequence, our bromeliads have continued growing at a good rate throughout the first month of winter. We have the best of both worlds because the slight slowdown in growth due to cooler temperatures and lowered sunlight has given our *Neoregelia*, in particular, vibrant colors.

This growth will certainly end

sometime during this winter, but we should take advantage of as much growing season as we can. This means, in particular, keeping a close eye on the water needs of your plants. During

periods of active growth, it is very important to keep your plants from drying out too much. Of course, when the plants do stop growing, and the primary problem can easily be overwatering. The important thing is to look at your plants frequently. If the soil mix in your pots is drying out, your plants need the occasional soaking to maintain Tram Ride in April roots aren't growing and can't use any more water.



Aechmea orlandiana and Aechmea 'Bert' are both nearing the end of their blooming cycles. They were joined during the month by the closely related Aechmea milsteiniana, with Aechmea fosteriana and Aechmea gurkeniana now in advanced bud. The various clones of Aechmea weilbachii also started, and finished, bloom during the month. We can expect the pups from these plants to bloom within the next month or so. Other plants blooming for the first time in a while include Aechmea bromeliifolia, Aechmea dealbata, Aechmea ramosa and Aechmea woronowii. Several species continued in bloom from last month. Aechmea mexicana is notable in this group because so many rosettes flowered during the month. In contrast, a lone plant of Aechmea alopecurus bloomed into December. The expected blooming of species in Aechmea subgenus Ortgiesia continued with Aechmea gracilis as an example. Other groups with representatives blooming during the month were

> the Gravisia complex, represented by Aechmea blanchetiana and Aechmea amicorum, and the Aechmea nudicaulis complex. Finally, Aechmea chantinii has shown a resurgence in bloom intensity. month, there are two notable clones: Aechmea chantinii 'DeLeon' and Aechmea chantinii 'Tarapoto' in bloom along with the expected assortment of seedlings.

Androlepis skinneri began to bloom near the beginning of the month. Both staminate ('male') plants and pistillate ('female') plants are in

bloom. The inflorescence on an individual plant does not last much longer than a month, but, if you have several plants in your collection, these plants will not all bloom at the same time, so you get an extended flowering period for the species. If you have both staminate and pistillate plants (ovaries on the pistillate plants are 2 to 3 times as large as those on the staminate plants), you could cross-pollinate them to produce seeds.

Billbergia species and hybrids are putting out

their evanescent spikes. I have been seeing primarily different clones of *Billbergia amoena* in flowers.

Canistropsis seidelii finally began to flower in December. The inflorescence was up and fully colored through November.

Even though we are approaching the middle of winter, I noticed flowers on *Cryptanthus teretifolius* and *Cryptanthus warren-loosei*. As was the case last year, I believe we can expect to find a few examples in bloom throughout the winter even if the plants suffer terribly when our inevitable cold spell(s) make an appearance.

Plants of Guzmania minor are continuing to produce short-lived inflorescences as winter approaches. Guzmania sanguinea was also in flower near the beginning of the month, but now seems finished for the year.

The inflorescence on my final blooming *Hechtia rosea* faded away about a week before Christmas.

*Lymania coralina*, a somewhat uncommon species in cultivation, began to bloom during December.

Many plants of Neoregelia compacta are in bloom or bud. The closely related Neoregelia macwilliamsii is also producing blooms, although not in nearly the same proportion as Neoregelia compacta. Neoregelia spectabilis is also blooming this month. Among the smaller Neoregelia species, Neoregelia ampullacea 'Midget', Neoregelia dungsiana and Neoregelia punctatissima (the red leaf form) were also seen with open flowers.

Several species of *Orthophytum* are in bloom now. *Orthophytum zanonii* and *Orthophytum saxicola* (green form) are just starting. On the other hand, *Orthophytum alvimii*, *Orthophytum disjunctum* (purple leaf form) and *Orthophytum lymaniana* are continuing to bloom. The *Orthophytum zanonii* in bloom is something of a puzzle since other plants of this species flowered within a short period several months ago.

Pitcairnia flammea floccosa, a species that blooms with leaves barely 1 foot tall, produced its bright red flowers during the month. We also had Pitcairnia smithiorum in bloom throughout the month.

Portea alatisepala has been flowering en masse throughout the month. This includes several

different clones. We have also had a single clone of *Portea petropolitana petropolitana* in flower throughout the month. With the latter species, we have had different collections blooming at different times of the year..

Much blooming activity should be evident in your

Several Tillandsia collection. clones of Tillandsia ionantha (including the Tillandsia ionantha 'Tall Velvet' and Tillandsia ionantha vanhyningii mentioned in previous months) were in full color for the holiday season. Blooming also picked up in Tillandsia subgenus Anoplophytum with flowers continuing to appear on Tillandsia didisticha and Tillandsia vernicosa in addition to blooms (at least sporadically) on Tillandsia araujei, Tillandsia tenuifolia and Tillandsia stricta. Tillandsia brachycaulos (the particularly beautiful burgundy leaf form) bloomed during the month. Two species with swollen bases ('pseudobulbs'), Tillandsia bulbosa and Tillandsia

pseudobaileyi, also began to flower during December. In the meantime, *Tillandsia chiapensis* continued to produce flowers, along with *Tillandsia dodsonii* and *Tillandsia fasciculata*.

VThe only *Vriesea* species I can verify with open flowers during the month is *Vriesea carinata*. There could well be other species that bloomed, but I missed them.

Take advantage of the warm weather while it lasts, but prepare yourself for the inevitable onslaught of cold weather. At least prepare an emergency plan so you know what plants to save if we end up with an arctic front threatening a freeze on short notice. Just remind yourself we only have about two months where freezing weather is at all likely. Once we get towards the end of February, we can again let down our guard and dream the pleasant dreams of lush new growth on fabulous bromeliads \_ it is only a few weeks away.
