Silent Auction Rules and Regulations Revisited

Please observe the following Rules and Regulations

- 1. Plants must be free of insects and diseases.
- 2. Plants must have the correct nametag.
- 3. Payments by cash or check only.
- 4. Maximum number of plants to be brought in by members is 3 (exceptions can be made. Consult with the Chairman prior to the meeting)
- 5. Bring only choice plants, in good condition.
- 6. Please do not bring discards.
- 7. The Club receives 20% of all sales; members 80%. However, members who would like to donate a plant to the Club may do so by specifying on the SA form that 100% of the proceeds should go to the Club.
- 8. When SA closes, please refrain from approaching the SA table. It leads to confusion for the Chairman and for everyone involved in helping distribute the plants. Wait until the name of the winner is called. Good Luck!



In Case You Missed It-By Leonard Goldstein

How often do you hear a great program on bromeliads from a resident of Knoxville, Tennessee -- average January low temperature, 28°? Not often at all, but BSSF did in April. That's when Steve Hoppin spoke to a receptive audience about his nearly 25 years as a bromeliad hybridizer.

In all fairness, Steve was one of us – a resident of hot, steamy southern Florida – until 2021. His concentration on bromeliads dates back to 2000, and since then, he has created 20-plus Cryptanthus hybrids, including 'Love Potion #9.' He was Cryptanthus Society president from 2006 to 2012. His appearance before our group was delayed three years by COVID-19. Now ensconced in a nice home nearly 900 ft. above sea level, Steve was in town to serve as a judge at the annual BSSF Show & amp, Sale.

To be sure, Steve's growing practices in Knoxville have changed. His plants now spend a lot of the year in a garage under lights, but that doesn't appear to have dampened his enthusiasm. "What can you grow in Knoxville?" he asked rhetorically. "Plenty," he replied. In fact, Aechmea recurvata 'Aztec Gold' might grow better in East Tennessee than in South Florida!

His program was titled, "The Cryptanthus Group: Obligated Terrestrials." Cryptanthus, he warned, is a true terrestrial bromeliad. Its roots don't just stabilize. the plants as do those of other genera, but they also search for nutrients. (Leaf litter helps provide a few of the needed nutrients.) Some are lithophytes – rock growers – but no Cryptanthus species has ever been reported growing epiphytically. All species are native to Brazil, from sunny/dry to shady/moist environments.

Most Cryptanthus species are round or oval in shape. Leaves do not overlap, and no central cup forms. Large specimens can reach 2+ ft. in diameter. The color range is fairly broad: pink-red-green-gray, gray and brown, expresso brownalbomarginated-variegated-shiny-mottled-striped. Some species can be partially or heavily covered with trichomes, i.e., the outgrowths on the surface of leaves that absorb water and minerals for the plant's benefit, and also protect the plant from things like herbivores and UV rays.

Translated from latinized Greed, 'Cryptanthus' means 'hidden flowers.' Most flowers in the genus are white, but some are colored, and a few are even

fragrant. A plant might produce 25 flowers, but normally only 1-3 open at a time. The flowers are imperfect, producing only stamens. Plants bloom for a period of four days to two weeks. Steve wryly observed that Cryptanthus plants are not. bought for their flowers.

Steve then offered some cultural advice. Offsets should be 1/3 the size of the parent plant before removal. In planting separated offsets, he recommended applying a rooting hormone. Use 4-6" pots – Steve prefers plastic – with great drainage. For a loose, porous mix, he uses Pro-Mix with some additives. Coco coir is also good and can be combined with Vermiculite. Turface (calcined clay) helps promote porosity. When repotting, use a #2 pencil to prepare a label.

- (1) Appropriate light exposure is, of course, important. Medium bright should be the goal. Light that's too low will result in strappy leaves, and full sun can burn. The right light maximizes colors, although Steve noted that Cryptanthus plants undergo seasonal color changes, with strongest coloration occurring during the summer.
 - (2) Temperature is another key cultural element; 60-85° is optimal, but plants can tolerate lows of 40-55°.
 - (3) Humidity is another important factor. It should be in the 40-90% range.
 - (4) With regard to watering, plants should be kept evenly damp. Overhead Irrigation is okay. The key to successful growing is good drainage.
 - (5) Steve applies a couple of different blends of fertilizer: 14-14-14 or 20-20-20, a half teaspoon per plant. He uses time-release products in 3-, 6-, or 9-month blends.
- (6) Good air circulation is essential to avoid pests and fungi. Insects and Other pests are rare in Cryptanthus unless the plants are stressed. The Evil Weevil does like this genus, and it can be treated with Imidacloprid granules.

Steve then turned to the subject of how to show Cryptanthus plants. First, it requires good planning. Look for good conformation, such as lack of gaps between leaves. The plant should be mature. If the flowers don't look great, snip them out. He urged growers to respect judges' decisions and pay attention to their written comments.

Steve also touched on taxonomic changes to the Cryptanthus group (or complex). There have been major changes since 2017. There are now five genera in the group. RNA and DNA problems have contributed to the changes. In closing his program, Steve acknowledges those who were his mentors in the field of bromeliads: Gene McKenzie (a founder of the Caloosahatchee Bromeliad Society), Dean Fairchild, Craig Allen, Grace Goode, Jim Irvin, Carole Richtmyer, Larry Giroux, Rick Ryals, Grant Groves, Kelli Ahnen, and Anthony Warfield.




